Reporting Mastitis in PCDART using Health Conditions

PCDART allows you to enter mastitis incidences using one of five different Health Codes. There is a separate code for each quarter of the udder, and another to use when multiple quarters are affected. There is also a remark area where you can enter more details about the incident.

To record an animal with a mastitis event, open the Input Desk and select Health Conditions
